

1783 which he had contracted to perform, and to furnish the planks for 100 lbs. of Tobacco, for every hundred feet thereof.

1784 On the 15<sup>th</sup> of April, 1784, Francis Hunkley the Vestry's Clerk was ordered to bring up the Chest and Communion Table from the old church - But the pews were not yet made. Harris had failed to fulfil his agreement, and now Robert De Bult was employed to execute the work. - On the 10<sup>th</sup> of the September following, Joshua Hall was employed to build a gallery, according to a draft furnished him, for which he was to have £ 41. currency, the Vestry furnishing the planks.

1785 In the next year, <sup>A Surplice,</sup> Feb. 11. the Vestry ordered 360 lbs. of Tobacco to be paid for making a surplice, by which <sup>we</sup> are shown, that the surplice was then used by the minister in performing divine service, and provided at the Vestry's expense. And on 29<sup>th</sup> of the April following, the Clerk was ordered to advertize for the plaistering of the chancel, that having not yet been done.

1786 Little attracts our notice in the Vestry's records of this year. On the 26<sup>th</sup> of April, 1786, however, - it is noted, that Doct. George Walker, presented to the Vestry, of which he was one, a punch bowl for their use, and we have a right to suppose, that it was used for the purpose for which the donor intended it, or it would not have been given. At the same date <sup>3</sup> turned columns to be put under the gallery for its support, were ordered. And at length, Feb. 15, 1788, an agreement was made with Joshua Hall, to plaister the Church for the sum of £ 75. paper Currency.

1789 It appears that now, May, 8. 1789 the plaistering of the Church was at last finished, and the building thus completed, more than twelve years were thus passed away, since the matter of build-
